

CANTIUM ELECTRONICS LTD CONFLICT MINERALS POLICY STATEMENT

On July 21, 2010, the Dodd-Frank Wall Street Reform and Consumer Protection Act was signed into law. The Dodd-Frank Act and related U.S. Securities and Exchange Commission rules require certain companies to disclose the extent to which the products they manufacture or contract to manufacture contain so-called conflict minerals sourced from mines in the Democratic Republic of the Congo ("DRC") or adjoining countries. Conflict minerals include tantalum, tin, tungsten and gold, which are used in many electronic components and computer products.

As a distributor of electronic components, Cantium promotes the traceability of these minerals and the transparency of the supply chain. Cantium firmly believes that its customers should be fully informed about the products they purchase. While Cantium, as a distributor, is not able to certify as to the country of origin of the minerals contained in the products supplied to Cantium, Cantium is committed to working with its customers to supply products that meet the customer's specifications. Please note that Manufacturers have made it clear that their distributors are not authorized to provide this complex data to the end customer, as traditional component distribution activities are not within the scope of the bill's definition of reporting requirements. However, Cantium realizes the importance of this initiative and fully supports its spirit.

Cantium Electronics Ltd is committed to sourcing materials from companies that share our values around human rights, ethics and environmental responsibility. We expect our suppliers to support us fully with our endeavours.
